STEWARDSHIP — A STRATEGY TO SERVE

Exploring Stewardship: A Biblical Perspective

Stewardship holds a pivotal place in the Christian's journey, guiding us to comprehend the profound teachings of the Bible on this subject. As we delve into the essence of stewardship, we unravel the scriptural method of "laying up in store" for eternity.

The Foundation of Stewardship:

The Bible unfolds a fundamental truth – mankind enters this world devoid of material possessions, and upon departure for eternity, carries none beyond the grave. Yet, in the divine wisdom of scripture, a pathway emerges for securing treasures in eternity.

Biblical Principles of Stewardship:

God is the sole owner of all things. To be a good steward, one must recognize this principle. Stewards are entrusted by God to use His goods and abilities in an approved manner. The parable in Luke 16:1–13 emphasizes the consequences of misusing what God provides. Talents are given for earning a living, enjoying life without idolizing pleasures, and returning a portion for God's work (I Timothy 6:17; I Chronicles 29:14).

Stewardship extends beyond money to include time and abilities. Faithfulness in managing current blessings determines future ones (Luke 16:10–11). The law of sowing and reaping in II Corinthians 9:6–8 underscores that our harvest aligns with our sowing. Being content and using current blessings wisely glorifies God and leads to increased blessings. Eventually, everyone must give an account of their stewardship before the Lord (II Corinthians 5:10). Believers will account for their works and the resources entrusted to them.

STEWARDSHIP OF OUR TIME

• Psalm 90:12 and Ephesians 5:16 emphasize the importance of redeeming time, and making the most of it.

What God demands in the stewardship of our time:

• According to Psalm 62:8, God requires trust in Him at all times.

Right relationship with God:

- Ephesians 5:17-18 underscores the need to understand the will of the Lord and to be filled with the Spirit for effective stewardship.
- Acts 1:8 indicates that the Holy Spirit provides power through the Baptism of the Holy Spirit.
- Colossians 3:17 emphasizes performing stewardship duties in the name of the Lord Jesus.

Disposition and attitude in utilizing time:

- Ephesians 5:19-20 outlines the positive attitudes and actions in utilizing time:
- Positive self-talk
- Singing and making melody in our hearts
- Giving thanks always for all things
- Reverential praise

The most important use of time:

- Mark 16:15 highlights the crucial role of spending time aggressively witnessing about Jesus.
- Proverbs 11:30 describes a soul winner as wise in the eyes of God.

Greatest thing for others:

- The greatest thing one can do for another, according to Mark 16:15, is to share Jesus and lead them to Christ.
- Luke 15:7, 10 reveals that in God's presence when one repents and receives Christ, joy is found in heaven and among the angels of Go

STEWARDSHIP OF OUR POSSESSIONS

Giving to God

The foundation of giving to the Lord is in Malachi 3:10, emphasizing the concept of tithing, meaning a tenth part. Tithing predates the Hebrew law, with Abraham practicing it as a way to honor God. Jesus affirmed tithing in Matthew 23:23. Leviticus 27:30, 31 reinforces that the tithe belongs to the Lord.

Withholding it, as warned in Malachi 3:9, results in a curse. Bringing the tithe to the storehouse, as in Malachi 3:10, supports God's work, and in the New Testament, this translates to giving to the church for ministry and advancing the Kingdom of God.

Barriers to Giving

Some hindrances to scriptural givinginclude a lack of Biblicalunderstanding, backsliding, misplaced affection (see 1 Timothy6:9-10), and selfishness. Pastors and teachersplay a crucial role in overcoming these barriers by fearlessly teachingthe principles of giving found in the Bible. Neglecting devotion, prayer, and the house of God often accompanies a decline in giving.

Embracing Jesus' words in Acts 20:35 highlights the blessing of giving, emphasizing that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Engaging your heart in God's work makes giving easier.

Giving to God brings abundant blessings, surpassing any losses. Malachi 3 presents a direct challenge from God with three promised blessings:

- 1. Opening the windows of Heaven for revival
- 2. Rebuking the devourer to protect from harm, even in a recession
- 3. Blessing the endeavors of the faithful giver.

Additional promises of blessings can be found in I Timothy 6:17–19, Philippians 4:19, and Luke 6:38.

Trusting God and accepting the challenge in Malachi 3:10-11 allows one to test and experience His wonderful promises.

THE IMPORTANCE OF BIBLE STUDY, PRAYER, OBEDIENCE, AND WITNESSING

The Significance of Delving into God's Word

The Bible as a Comprehensive Revelation

The Bible stands as the most pivotal book ever penned. It transcends human authorship, embodying divine inspiration, literally God-breathed (II Timothy 3:16 –17).

God's written revelation of His will to mankind is encapsulated in the Bible(II Peter 1:21). The central theme of the Bible revolves around Jesus Christ (I Timothy3:16). Comprising 66 Books, written over 1600 years by approximately 40 authors, it spans both the Old and New Testaments, the former predominantly in Hebrew with some Aramaic and the latter in Greek. The translations we possess today stem from these ancient languages.

The Imperative of Engaging with God's Word

The entirety of God's communication is encapsulated in His Book. Failure to read and study the Bible implies a lack of access to God's wisdom. Neglecting God's Word leaves the Christian in ignorance of His plan and guidance.

Feeding on the Word

Just as physical survival necessitates nourishment, the spiritual life depends on consuming God's Word for an abundant existence. The Christian's spiritual sustenance is the sincere milk of the Word (I Peter 2:2). As Jesus emphasized, life is sustained not merely by bread but by every word proceeding from the mouth of God (Matthew 4:4).

Without Bible study, spiritual anemia sets in, leading to constant defeat. Spiritual vitality is sustained by regularly partaking in the essential spiritual nutrients within Scripture.

Abiding in the Word

To be an effective disciple of Jesus Christ, one must abide in the Truth, which is the Word of God.

Applying the Word

II Timothy 3:16, 17 outlines four fundamental functions of the Word of God in daily Christian living:

- 1. Doctrine or Teaching: Systematic declaration of truths from God's Word.
- 2. Reproof: Recognition (conviction) of sin, error, and spiritual deficiencies.
- 3. Correction: Improvement of spiritually deficient life patterns with restoration to scriptural norms.
- 4. Instruction: Development of scriptural life patterns through discipline.

01 <	Designate Specific Time: Allocate a dedicated time for Bible study, such as upon arising, retiring, or during lunch.
02 <	Find a good bible app or online resources and tools: YouVersion, Bible.com, biblegateway.com, blue letter bible
03 <	Own a Good Reference Bible: King James Version or Scofield's is recommended.
04 <	Utilize a Bible Commentary: The Bible Knowledge Commentary by John F. Walvoord and Roy B. Zuck is a valuable resource and Strong's Concordance.
05 <	Access a Bible Dictionary: Unger's Bible Dictionary or Nelson's Illustrated Bible Dictionary are recommended.

Unlocking the Significance of Prayer

Understanding Prayer

Our Heavenly Father desires our connection with Him through prayer. It's more than a daily ritual; it's a conversation with God, where we speak and listen, crucial for our Christian growth.

What is Prayer?

Prayer is the avenue to communicate everything with God—thoughts, desires, and more. Delighting in the Lord involves finding the highest joy in serving Him.

ELEMENTS OF PRAYER



- 1.<u>Confession</u>: Start with confessing, acknowledging wrongdoing, and seeking repentance. a.True confession leads to a transformed disposition.
- 2.<u>Adoration</u>: Express deep feelings towards God, acknowledging His attributes. Praising God for who He is builds confidence in prayer.
- 3. <u>Thanksgiving</u>: Grow in expressing gratitude to God, starting with the often-overlooked blessings. Thank Him continually; it aligns with God's will.
- 4. <u>Intercession:</u> Pray boldly for the needs of others, focusing on spiritual aspects. Pray for spiritual growth in fellow believers and for the salvation of the unsaved.
- 5. <u>Petition</u>: Ask God to meet specific needs in your life, expecting answers based on faith. a. Belief and alignment with God's will are crucial for effective petitions.
- 6. <u>Meditation</u>: Listen to what God has to say. After pouring out your thoughts, take time to hear from God. Be open and listen attentively.

THE SECRET OF A SUCCESSFUL PRAYER LIFE



- 1. **The People of Prayer:** Personalize your prayer life. Take a daily inventory of your prayer habits.
- 2. **The Period of Prayer:** Set a regular time dedicated to prayer. Consistency is key to an effective prayer life.
- 3. **The Place of Prayer:** Have a dedicated space free from distractions for effective and focused prayers.
- 4. **The Privacy of Prayer:** Your place of prayer should offer privacy for honest communication with the Lord.
- 5. **The Privilege of Prayer:** Recognize the privilege of coming before God's throne through prayer. Understand that your Heavenly Father hears your prayers.
- 6. **The Promise of Prayer:** When meeting the conditions of sincere prayer, trust that your Father in Heaven will answer. Review your prayers and life if answers seem delayed.
- 7. **The Plan of Prayer:** Keep prayers plain, simple, and to the point. Long repetitions or empty words don't impress God; sincerity and faith do.
- 8. **The Power of Prayer:** Examples from Scripture highlight the power of prayer. James 5:17, Mark 11:24, and Matthew 18:19 showcase the impact of prayer in various situations.

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF OBEDIENCE AND WITNESSING

Living the Christian Life

The Christian life is the embodiment of Christ's life in believers, empowered by the Holy Spirit. It's akin to a branch abiding in the vine, representing the Christian's obedience to Christ, as illustrated in John 15:4.

The Essence of Obedience

Obedience is the litmus test of our love for Christ (John 14:21). Just as physical laws govern our lives, spiritual laws set us free (John10:10). Satan tempts us to disobey these spiritual laws, but complete surrender to Christ grants victory (Romans 8:32).

To be obedient, one must crave a holy life:





Purity with the Opposite Sex: The Bible upholds the sanctity of marriage and warns against immorality (Hebrews 13:4; I Corinthians 6:18). Fleeing from temptation is advised to avoid sin (Proverbs 6:32; I Thessalonians 4:3).



Purity and Forgiveness: The term "propitiation" in I John 2:1 and 2 signifies satisfying God's righteous demands. Confession is the path to God's forgiveness (I John 1:9).



Controlling the Tongue

James 3:2-8 underscores the power of the tongue. Colossians 3:8, 9 lists sins of the tongue as grave as other sins. Controlling the tongue is essential for spiritual growth:

- 1. **Understanding the Tongue's Power:** The tongue, though small, holds immense power, influencing the believer's life (James 3:7, 8; Matthew 12:34).
- 2. **Practicing Control:** To grow spiritually, believers must master the fundamentals of controlling the tongue. Key principles include:

Psalm 39:1: Exercising control, especially in the presence of the unsaved. Colossians 4:6: Allowing grace and God's power to temper our speech.

Ephesians 4:29: Eliminating corrupt speech and speaking edifying words.

Ephesians 4:15: Grounding our conversation in truth and rooted in love.

THE IMPACT OF THE TONGUE: A TOOL FOR GOOD OR EVIL



Warnings on Tongue Use:

- Psalm 12:3: Guarding against flattery and pride.
- Psalm 52:2 4: Vigilance against mischief, deceit, and lying.
- Matthew 15:8: Caution against mere lip service without a life testimony.

Using the Tongue for God's Glory:

- Proverbs 14:25: Engaging in soul-winning conversations.
- Proverbs 15:4: Turning the tongue into a tree of life.
- Colossians 3:16: Elevating speech to expressions of praise.
- Romans 10:9: Confessing Christ boldly.

Tongue and Heart in Obedience:

- Luke 6:45: Reflecting the heart's content through speech.
- Proverbs 23:7: Acknowledging the influence of thoughts on one's being.
- Ephesians 6:5, 6: Emphasizing obedience from the heart.

Defining a Witness:

• A witness is someone compelled to speak about what they have seen and heard (Acts 4:20; Acts 22:15).

Motivation for Witnessing:

• Psalm 107:2 encourages the redeemed to vocalize their testimony.

Jesus' Command and Promise:

- Jesus commands believers to go and preach the gospel to the world (Mark 16:15).
- Those faithful to follow Jesus receive the promise to be fishers of men (Matthew 4:19).

Baptism in the Holy Spirit:

• Acts 1:8 underscores the empowerment for witnessing that comes with the Holy Spirit's baptism.

Witnessing and the Word of God:

The Power of the Word

• Hebrews 4:12 highlights the penetrating effect of the Word on the non-Christian's heart, soul, and spirit.

Nourishment through the Word

• Committing Scripture to memory, as advised in Romans 10:17 and Psalm 119:11, provides spiritual nourishment.

Witnessing and Prayer:

• Prayer precedes effective witnessing, recognizing the divine order of talking to God about people before talking to people about God.

Witnessing and the Holy Spirit:

• The Holy Spirit plays a vital role in conviction and exposure, bringing individuals face to face with the truth about their condition and need. Personal witnessing, when empowered by the Holy Spirit, is impactful in presenting these crucial facts.

SPIRITUAL GIFTS—DEVELOPING A SERVING ATTITUDE

This lesson will teach you what spiritual gifts are; the purpose, role, and function of spiritual gifts in each Believer and church family; and how to discover, recognize, and utilize your own spiritual gift(s).

Facts Concerning Spiritual Gifts

Spiritual gifts are the primary channel through which the Holy Spirit ministers (1 Corinthians 12:25).

- They are tools for ministry (Ephesians 4:12)
- A source of joy (2 Corinthians 7:4)
- Building blocks of the Church (1 Corinthians 3:9)

Definition:

• God's enabling for edifying the body of Christ, glorifying the Father, and bringing joy in our Christian experience.

Recipients:

• Every believer receives at least one spiritual gift at the time of the New Birth (1 Peter 4:10; Romans 12:3; 1 Corinthians 12:7–11).

Trinity's Involvement (1 Corinthians 12:4–6):

- The Holy Spirit gives the gifts.
- The Son places believers in the ministry.
- The Father gives the results.

What Spiritual Gifts Are Not:

- NOT rewards; given by God's grace, not based on faithfulness.
- NOT to be confused with natural talent; talents are received at natural birth, while spiritual gifts are received at spiritual birth.
- NOT tied to a specific place, age group, or specialty in ministry.

Developing Your Spiritual Gift:

- Align with God's will:Be saved (2 Peter 3:9)
- Sanctified (1 Thessalonians 4:3)
- Spirit- filled (Ephesians 5:17-18)
- Submissive (1 Peter 2:13–15)
- Willing to endure suffering (2 Timothy 3:12; 1 Peter 3:17)
- Ready to serve (Romans 12:1–3)

DISCOVERING YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFT:

- 1. Be Informed:
- Study spiritual gifts to understand their parameters.
- 2.Be Open:
- Don't hastily focus on one gift to the exclusion of others.
- 3. Be Available:
- Willingly serve in various ministry areas, even if you feel unprepared.

4.Be Sensitive and Sensible:

• Avoid forcing yourself into a particular gift if it doesn't align with your evident abilities.

Support Gifts:

1. Apostleship:

- Ephesians 4:11; I Corinthians 12:28
- Foundational ministry for establishing church practices.

2. Prophecy:

- Romans 12:6; Ephesians 4:11; I Corinthians 12:10, 14:1-10
- Proclaiming God's truth through Spirit-given capacity.
- 3. Evangelism:
- Ephesians 4:11
- Leading people beyond one's influence to the knowledge of Christ.
- 4. Pastor-Teacher:
- Ephesians 4:11
- Overseeing, training, and caring for a group of Christians.
- 5. Teaching:
- I Corinthians 12:28
- Clarifying God's Word with accuracy and simplicity.

Service Gifts:

6. Administration:

- Romans 12:8
- Organizing, administering, and leading church affairs.

- Giving material resources beyond the tithe to support God's work.
